Aims/Objectives/Rationale

This module aims to develop students' critical, theoretical and practical skills to enable them to discuss all aspects of photography including planning, creating, editing and evaluating digital photographs; and to produce professional images.

Module Content

This module introduces students to the principals and practice of photography and photojournalism. Through a series of practical assignments students will cover the following main themes:

- Critical evaluation of photographs
- Modes of photography (Genres) – landscape, urban, architecture, macro, portrait, group, night, action, abstract.
- Principals of photography (theory and practice) - composition, shape, colour, texture, line, tone, field of view, depth of field
- Digital cameras including Canon SLR
- Lighting theory and practice (studio & location)
- Editing and enhancing photographs
- Photojournalism principles and practices

Emphasis will be placed on class participation and each student's ability to critically analyse their own work as well as the work of their peers.

Introducing the Module:

If, as the famous saying goes, 'a picture is worth a thousand words' why is this so? This wise adage used by many cultures long before the invention of photography is as true in today's digital world as it was when it was first coined centuries ago.

As a class we will investigate why this is so and consider what makes a good photograph. In addition we will explore some of the techniques photographers use to create memorable images. We shall also explore photojournalism. What is its power, and how does a series of images combine to tell a story?

This module will introduce to you both the theory and practice of photography. You will become familiar with nine photographic genres, with composition, and narrative. You will also learn to critically analyse imagery, which will furnish your knowledge in professional communication and the media.

You are required to contribute both in class and out of class hours. Ultimately it is up to you how much you wish to contribute to this module yet the more you contribute the more you will get out of it and the higher your final grade will be.

Lectures:

Our contact class time is 2 hours per week – this will be divided as follows:
Discussion of the previous week's uploaded photographs and any class issues.
Lecture on the genre for the current week and preparation for the next week's assessment submission.

Independent Work (OUTSIDE OF CLASS HOURS):

Student Workload = 10 hours per week

Contact Hours for timetabling = 2 hours per week

This means you are required to work on this module for 8 hours per week in between classes.

This time is used to:

- Take photographs.
- Edit photographs.
- Arrange the logistics for taking your assessment photographs.
- Take your assignment photographs.
- Research the week's genre of photographs on the web and elsewhere.

As well as...

- Upload your photographs to the class blog (Minimum of 1 photograph per week per student / Maximum of 2 photographs per week per student – if you feel you need to include more bring them to class and we can look at them in class time).
- Analyse and critically evaluate (in your own words) your own photographs on the class blog.
- AND Analyse and critically evaluate (in your own words) your class-members photographs on the class blog (be constructive, do not be negative or rude).
- Critically evaluate (in your own words) other photographs (photographs you find online i.e. famous photographs) for your written essay as well as for the class blog.

The Class Blog:

Is our class online space – everyone has the same access.

This is where you upload **your weekly photographic assignments**.

It is also where you discuss, analyse, experiment, give and receive feedback, and engage with the module and its content.

Participation in the class blog is **essential** and is assessed.

Assessment Item 1.

Discussion and critical evaluation of the genres of photography covered in the module (Evidence of contribution to critical discussion and analysis of class materials, your own work, as well as the work of your peers, presented on the class blog)

Total = 20% of this, 10% is for critically analysing your own and your peers work and another 10% is for critically analysing each week's genre.

HINT: "I like it" or "I don't like it" is NOT critically analysing.

Assessment Item 2.

Professional project (photo essay – series of a minimum of (6) six images that work together as a series – this is separate to your portfolio) **30%**

Assessment Item 3.

Portfolio of work - portfolio of at least (5) five individual photographs you have taken of any of the (9) nine genres studied during the module

eg: 1 x architecture, 1 x abstract, 1 x portrait, 1 x Macro & 1 x Night photograph.

As well as a **1,500 word critical evaluation** (showing evidence of your research and written in your own words) of one of your chosen genres

eg: portraiture. **50%** of this, 25% is for your portfolio of photographs and another 25% is for your 1,500 word critical evaluation of one genre.
